Students from Texas have helped raise awareness of a terrible tragedy. The seventh- and eighth-grade students from the Lorene Rogers Middle School have been campaigning on Twitter since April 6th for people to remember the 1994 Rwanda genocide. Their "teensMAD4Rwanda" project aimed to generate a million Twitter messages (tweets) in 100 days - 'MAD' means 'making a difference'. They won advertising space in the 'USA Today' newspaper for their efforts. Teacher Tara Gipson said their hope was "to stop the violence from occurring again through understanding and education"

The class had dinner with Rwandan President Paul Kagame and met many survivors of the Rwandan genocide. Up to a million people lost their lives in the horror. This was about 20 per cent of the population. The killing happened because of tensions between two ethnic groups in Rwanda – the Hutus and Tutsis. The Hutus believed the Tutsis wanted to enslave them so they called for the killing of all Tutsis. The world looked on at the bloodbath for three months and did nothing. The Texas students' million tweets represent the million deaths.
